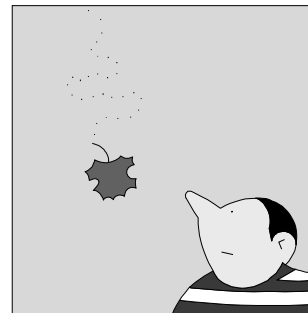

NASFAA Decentralized Training

TASFAA President, Nancy M. Beverly

The topic for the NASFAA decentralized fall training is **student eligibility**. Questions will be answered about:

- Academic credentials
- Academic requirements for admissions versus Title IV aid
- Ability to benefit (ATB)
- Resolving database matches
- Definition of Veteran and Veteran (VA) status
- Citizenship and noncitizens
- Drug convictions and criteria for rehabilitation programs
- Citizenship and noncitizens
- Enrollment status tracking
- Documentation requirements
- Impact of institutional policies on student eligibility



TASFAA will be taking this training across the state to East Tennessee, Middle Tennessee and West Tennessee. Clyde Walker, Associate Director, Vanderbilt University will be our trainer and Janette Overton, TASFAA Training Chair will be coordinating the three training workshops. At a later date, TASFAA membership will receive information regarding dates, times and locations for each training workshop.

TASFAA 2003-2004 Committee Descriptions

The following briefly describes the function of each TASFAA committee. The approximate number of members serving on each committee is identified in parentheses.

Association Governance - Recommends policies concerning budget issues, provides counsel to the TASFAA President on the budget, oversees the annual audit, and monitors reserve funding. Drafts resolutions or changes to the bylaws as directed by the Executive Board and presents them to the membership for vote. Works with the association's strategic oversight by setting goals and striving to achieve them. Every five years or so, the committee also updates the association's long-range plan. (6)

Awards - Prepares and presents awards for length of service, special accomplishments, professional milestones and honors. This includes collecting nominations, working with the Executive Board on selection and purchasing the plaque or award token. (5)

Computer Network - Coordinates the implementation and maintenance of the TASFAA web page, recommends activities to improve our electronic communications, and works with the program chairs in coordinating training sessions and demonstration workshops. (5)

Counselor Internship Project - Coordinates the training of high school counselors (usually 20-25 each summer), and then places these counselors in Tennessee higher education institutions for summer employment. The high school counselor is paid through funding from TSAC. (7)

Diversity Committee - Works with the program committee and Executive Board to bring opportunities to our membership to increase their awareness of the diversity that exists within our association and the population that we serve. (4)

Financial Aid Awareness - Coordinates all activities for Financial Aid Awareness Month (January). This includes setting up a committee with representatives from each district, contacting the Governor's office for a proclamation and developing activities and promotional activities to advance awareness in the general population of aid availability and the application process. (8)

Government Relations - Responsible for keeping the membership apprised of federal and state legislative initiatives in order to recommend responses or action from the association. Notices to the officers and members can be sent through the newsletter, mail or email. (6)

Committee Descriptions Continued

Historical - Organizes and maintains the archives for the association. Duties include maintenance of the President's Boards, Officer's Book and Scrapbook, collection of reports, pictures, paraphernalia and other association information from members for the archives, and coordinating the storage and microfilming of records. (4)

Membership - Solicits membership for TASFAA through letters, articles, and advertisements, keeps the official membership database for the association, and coordinates conference registration with the association treasurer. Serves as editor for the annual Membership Directory. Also works with the Public Relations Chair and Computer Network Chair to provide up-to-date membership information for their publications. (4)

Newsletter - Coordinates the publishing of three issues of The Crossfeed, TASFAA's newsletter. This includes collecting articles, letters, and reports from the association's officers and chairs, soliciting advertisements for each issue, formatting and editing issue, working with the printer on publication and mailing issues to current members. Also will include working with the Computer Network Chair to provide an electronic version of the newsletter. (1-4)

Nominations - Chaired by the Past President, this committee solicits nominations for the elected offices of the association and coordinates the slate and election activities, including printing, mailing and counting ballots. (4)

Program - Coordinates the fall and spring TASFAA conferences. Activities include the selections of keynote and concurrent session speakers and coordination of social activities. (14)

Project Development - Assesses the needs of the association and its constituents to determine what projects/programs could be offered. Identifies potential projects that could be submitted to NASFAA for a state award. Researches other state organizations, NASFAA and additional sources for project/program ideas for the association. (6)

Public Relations - Collects biographical information on board members and coordinates announcements regarding elections, activities, etc. to the public. (5)

Site Selection - Obtains bids or proposals for future conference sites, visits the sites, and negotiates a contract with the hotel chosen for meeting rooms, exhibit area, food services, hotel services, sleeping rooms, etc. (5)

Sponsorship Development - Serves as a liaison between contributors and the association and works closely with the program committee in conference planning. Tasks include printing informational brochure, keeping in contact with contributors, recognizing contributors at conferences, and assisting with door prizes. (3)

State Programs - Serves as the liaison between the state agencies that coordinate vocational rehabilitation and Workforce Investment Act benefits. Keeps the membership current on regulations governing these programs and how they affect federal aid eligibility. Coordinates cross-training when necessary. (5)

Training - Coordinates training opportunities for the association's members including the New Aid Officers Workshops and keeps a schedule of other opportunities at the state, regional and national levels. (6)

TSAC Advisory - Chaired by the Past President, this committee is responsible for advising the TSAC Board on actions to be taken regarding the state's scholarship, grant, loan and work programs. (15 - multi-year members so typically 5 chosen per year)

Pressnell Appointed to Congressional Advisory Committee 5-27-2003

Nashville, TN - Tennessee Independent Colleges and Universities Association's President, Claude O. Pressnell, Jr., has been appointed to the Advisory Committee on Student Financial Assistance. The Committee serves as an independent source of advice and counsel to the United States Congress and the Secretary of Education on student aid issues. The appointment was made by Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, M.D. of Tennessee.

Since its inception in 1965, the Advisory Committee has been charged with providing technical expertise with regard to Federal Student Aid Programs. Its most important charge has been to provide advice that will lead to the maintenance and enhancement of access to college for low- and middle-income students.

"Dr. Pressnell is the right choice for this appointment," commented TICUA Chair Steve Flatt. "Not only has he been a financial aid administrator, but he has also been a tireless advocate for increased student aid for low-income Tennesseans at both the state and federal level." Flatt also serves as the President of Lipscomb University in Nashville.

Pressnell has served as the President of TICUA since 2000. He has been involved in the administration and advocacy of student financial assistance since 1987. Pressnell has degrees from Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar, Missouri, Wheaton College in Wheaton, Illinois and received his doctorate in Higher Education Administration from Vanderbilt University.

"It's an honor to be selected to serve on such an important Committee," stated Pressnell. "An educated citizenry has far reaching impact on our society, including enabling our country to stay on the competitive edge of a global economy. This Committee provides practical advice to Congress necessary to expand the educational opportunities for everyone."

The appointment is for a three year term and begins immediately. Pressnell will join ten other members of the Committee as a Senate appointee.

The Tennessee Independent Colleges and Universities Association (TICUA) was founded in 1956 to encourage cooperation among institutions of higher learning in Tennessee. TICUA engages Tennessee's private colleges to work collaboratively in areas of public policy, cost containment and professional development, to better serve the State and its citizens.

Reauthorization: To Be or Not To Be?

As you may have read, this Reauthorization is becoming more and more complex. With no expectation of additional funds, due to the budget situation, it has been suggested that very little change will occur. However, recent activity, primarily on the House side of Congress seems to be drawing some very partisan lines in the sand.

The House Education and Workforce Committee has produced three of the four bills it plans to present to the House for Reauthorization. The fourth bill, which includes Title IV, has not been completed and there seems to be a struggle within the Committee to reach bipartisan consensus. In that regard, other House members are floating bills that would bypass the Committee, but would address some very significant issues related to the Pell Grant, consolidation and reconsolidation of student loans, changes to the need analysis criteria to maintain the current state tax formula, and potentially significant changes to Direct Loans and Stafford Loans. A major problem facing these proposals is the way the Congressional Budget Office is scoring the cost of these changes. A single facet of one bill was scored at \$1.5 billion in the first year.

Adding to the challenge is that the Senate does not plan on starting a Reauthorization Bill until January or February of 2004. The Senate plans to have only one bill to match up with the four in the House. This situation will present significant issues when the Conference Committee meets for a consensus position.

Although recent surveys have shown that there is significant support for increasing loan limits in Reauthorization by students, parents, aid officers and others, the funding issue surfaces again. Additionally, two Washington-based student organizations and AASCU have formed a coalition opposed to increased loan limits. Congress is receiving mixed messages which usually results in no change or Congress going out on its own. Loan limits for freshman (first-year) borrowers have not changed since 1986, but college costs have increased significantly during that period and continue to rise.

Although all parties would like to see significant increases in the Pell Grant, it is just not likely due to the budget situation. Loans then become a focal point not for college choice but access to postsecondary education. Without loan limit increases, many school groups and NASFAA are concerned with access for needy students.

The costs of consolidation and reconsolidation focus new benefits on borrowers who are no longer students but received subsidies when they were in school. If additional subsidies are provided by consolidation or reconsolidation, the resources to help students wanting to go to college will be redirected. Congress has to determine where the focus will be: allowing more students to go to college for the first time or extending benefits to former students throughout the loan repayment period.

Another very significant issue is the focus on affordability and school accountability. Numerous school organizations are concerned about the suggested proposals to tie eligibility for Title IV participation to the tuition increases in comparison to the consumer price index or some similar cost of living index and the difference in the changes.

Some have speculated that due to the present partisanship of Congressional members relative to these issues, lack of projected new dollars and a tightening timetable, that Reauthorization will be postponed until after the November elections, which would throw the bills into 2005-2006. Others believe that both the Democrats and Republicans want to show they have done something positive regarding higher education and will have completed a Reauthorization Bill by September 30 in time for the last-minute election push.

Your TASFAA Reauthorization Committee and Government Relations Committee will be responding to the proposals as they take form with the House and Senate committees. You are welcome to comment to the TASFAA Committee members with your ideas and/or concerns.

Financial Aid Administrators Present Awards at 2003 NASFAA Conference

Washington, D.C. - At its annual conference last month in Salt Lake City, the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (NASFAA) presented its highest honors.

RICHARD TOMBAUGH was presented with a *Lifetime Achievement Award*, the highest award NASFAA can bestow on one of its Members. Tombaugh served as the first executive director of the NASFAA Washington office from 1970-1975. An expert on the principles and mechanics of every phase of the student aid process, his representation of NASFAA before the Congress and with the U.S. Department of Education proved of great value to the profession. A colleague observed that Tombaugh's greatest contribution during NASFAA's early years was helping to build and operate the fledgling Association. Without his efforts, it is doubtful that NASFAA would have survived its humble beginnings.

KENNETH WOOTEN also was honored with a *Lifetime Achievement Award*. Wooten gained national prominence among college aid professionals in 1969, when he served as the president and one of six founders of NASFAA. For 31 years, Wooten served the University of Mississippi diligently as a counselor, director of placement and financial aid, and finally as registrar and dean of admissions until his February 1991 retirement. He also served as a consultant for the U.S. Department of Education, the U.S. Justice Department, and several Mississippi junior colleges. His vision helped create some of the Association's most enduring products and services, including the *NASFAA Newsletter*.

CHARLES W. BRUCE received the *Distinguished Service Award* for outstanding achievements in furthering NASFAA's goals. Bruce served as NASFAA's national chair from July 1, 2002 to June 30, 2003. His thoughtful and deliberative leadership coupled with his commitment to "opening doors of educational opportunity" helped the Association formulate a balanced and rational set of public policy positions for the upcoming Reauthorization of the Higher Education Act.

JACQUELINE KING, director of the American Council on Education's Center for Policy Analysis, was awarded the *Robert P. Huff Golden Quill Award* for her outstanding contributions to the body of literature on student financial aid. Of particular importance are Kings' two recent publications: *Crucial Choices: How Students' Financial Decisions Affect Their Academic Success* and *2000 Status Report on the Pell Grant Program*. She also edited the book *Financing a College Education: How It Works, How It's Changing*. King has contributed greatly to NASFAA's research activities, including writing for the *Journal of Student Financial Aid* and *Student Aid Transcript* magazine.

The following six individuals received NASFAA's *State and Regional Leadership Award* for their outstanding contributions at the state and regional levels.

MARY SUE RIX, director of financial aid at Centenary College of Louisiana, Southwestern Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (SWASFAA)

SUE WEINREIS, assistant director of financial aid at Montana State University -Billings, Rocky Mountain Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (RMASFAA)

Tennessee Education Lottery Scholarship Program

Eligibility Requirements for 2004-05 Academic Year

- Entering freshmen (Class of 2004) and sophomores (Class of 2003) who are Tennessee residents for one year prior to application
- Enroll in a Tennessee public college/university or enroll in a Tennessee private college/university that is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS)
- Apply with the 2004-05 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or renewal 2004-05 FAFSA starting January 1 for each academic year (www.fafsa.ed.gov)
- FAFSA and renewal FAFSA application priority date – May 1. Early application recommended
- Full-time enrollment (part-time prorated) – leading to a certificate, diploma or degree – satisfactory academic progress required
- Award amounts based on available funding from State Lottery

Tennessee HOPE Scholarship

- Ø Award amount – \$3,000 for 4 year institutions; \$1,500 for 2 year institutions (no more than tuition and fees)
- Entering freshmen (Class 2004) must have at least an unweighted 3.0 GPA and a college core unweighted 3.0 GPA and
- Complete all college core and university track courses (20 units required) or
- 19 ACT (890 SAT)

OR

- College sophomores (Class of 2003) – Tennessee HOPE Scholarship criteria above and 2.75 cumulative GPA and 24 attempted hours in first college year

OR

- Home school graduates – 23 ACT (1060 SAT) or 525 GED and 19 ACT (890 SAT)
- GED applicants – 525 and 19 ACT (890 SAT)

General Assembly Merit Scholarship

- Ø Award amount – \$1,000 supplement to Tennessee HOPE Scholarship
- Entering freshmen must have at least an unweighted 3.75 GPA and a college core unweighted 3.75 GPA and 29 ACT (1280 SAT) and
- Complete all college core and university track courses (20 units required)

Need-Based Supplemental Award

- Ø Award amount – \$1,000 supplement to Tennessee HOPE Scholarship
- Meet Tennessee HOPE Scholarship requirements and
- Parent(s) adjusted gross income (on FAFSA) of \$36,000 or less (dependent student) or
- Student (and spouse) adjusted gross income (on FAFSA) of \$36,000 or less (independent student)

Tennessee HOPE Scholarship Renewal Criteria

- 1st year – 2.75 cumulative GPA and 24 attempted hours
- 2nd through 5th year – 3.0 cumulative GPA and 24 attempted hours each year

Tennessee HOPE Access Grant

- Ø Award amount – \$2,000 for 4 year institutions; \$1,250 for 2 year institutions
- Entering freshman must have at least an unweighted 2.75 GPA and a college core unweighted 2.75 GPA and 18 ACT (860 SAT) and
- Complete all required college core courses and

Tennessee Education Lottery Scholarship Program
Eligibility Requirements for 2004-05 Academic Year
Continued

- Parent(s) adjusted gross income of \$36,000 or less for dependent student or student (and spouse) for independent student
